To celebrate peace and peace-making by The Revd Alan M. Barker Suitable for Whole School (Primary)

#### Aims

To celebrate peace and peace-making.

#### Preparation and materials

- You will need a packet of Bassett's Jelly Babies.
- You will need to display the words 'Happy are those who work for peace: God will call them his children!' found in Matthew 5.9.

#### **Assembly**

- 1. Produce the packet of jelly babies. Identify the different colours and flavours: strawberry, lime, blackcurrant, lemon, raspberry, and orange. Which are most popular? You could conduct a quick opinion poll.
- 2. Explain that 'jelly babies' were first launched in 1918 to celebrate the end of the First World War. They were called 'Peace Babies' and quickly became popular. During the Second World War production ceased because of a shortage of ingredients. They were 'reborn' in 1953, renamed 'Jelly Babies'.
- 3. Invite the children to consider why the sale of Jelly Babies was a good way to celebrate peace. Reflect that the Peace Babies marked a new beginning (babies). They showed that life was returning to normal and could be fun again (jelly sweet).
- 4. Explain that in 1989 each of the six 'babies' was given a name and an identity. Refer to the illustrations and descriptions on the Bassett's packaging. Pink Baby Bonny wears a nappy and frilly bonnet. She is always crawling into mischief! Boofuls is soft-hearted and cries a lot, even when he is happy! Bumper is orange, wears a bum-bag, and bumps into things! Bubbles has her hair in a ponytail and is yellow. Bigheart is grey and always puts his friends first. Brilliant is the red leader of the gang.

Peace is enjoyed when people of different ages, interests and appearances live together in harmony. (Wouldn't a bag of jelly babies be dull if the

sweets were all one colour and flavour!)

5. Suggest that there's a sense in which we all can be 'Peace Babies'. Display this saying of Jesus:

'Happy are those who work for peace: God will call them his children!' (Matthew 5.9, Good News Bible)

Invite everyone to consider how they can 'work for peace'. You may wish to record the suggestions using different coloured pens. Some ideas might include: trying to listen and learn from other people instead of arguing; counting to ten before responding; finding out about different ways of living.

Refer back to the bag of sweets. Working for peace doesn't mean being soft (like a jelly baby). It calls for a strong commitment to friendship, fairness, being ready to share, and celebrating the good things of life together.

Pass the sweets around and invite everyone to enjoy a peace baby!




## Modern Parables Story and picture books with a message about peace

#### War and Peas - Michael Foreman





The 2 monsters - David McKee





Peace at last - Jill Murphy




The hour was late, and Mr Bear was tired. But he could not sleep - however he tried and wherever he tried.

## 5 Minutes Peace - Jill Murphy

## Reflection (5 Minutes' Peace)

#### Peace perfect peace

"Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." John 14:27

As the journey of Lent has begun we are given reflections to the peace Jesus attempts to gain peace in the wilderness - it appears not. Peace to commune with his father often interrupted by the disciples informing him yet again of the needs and requests of others. No peace to be found as he clears the cheats and impostors from the Temple. Jesus who is scolded by his closest friends Mary and Martha for not supporting them on the death of Lazarus, the peace Jesus had often enjoyed within their home absent…and yet the peace that Jesus offered brought Lazarus out of the tomb.

There was no peace as he entered Jerusalem, and yet Jesus chose to enter on a donkey as the 'Prince of Peace'. He peacefully washes the feet of his disciples in the upper room, yes even the feet of Judas with a different piece in mind, thirty to be exact. Jesus prayed for peace within the Garden of Gethsemane at a time when peace was ever greater, still he is struggling to find peace. Then the horror of Easter commences no peace, yet the soldiers they gamble for a piece of the clothing that was Jesus'.

Peace arrives with the joy of Easter Sunday that morning in the garden when they ask the gardener if he knows where Jesus' body has been taken. Peace turns to jubilation but also to the fear of having to be certain, sure, that Jesus is alive.

This is the time that as children and youth workers everyone wants a piece of our time and our skills. Easter worship, school visits to churches and, or, assemblies. The need to discern the real message of Easter in between the chicks, rabbits, chocolate and lambs it can become all-consuming not helped in part that Easter is late this year so blink and we're into summer prep too.

I hope that we can follow the words of Christ and in the midst of all we offer, plan, and deliver know His peace filling us with the skills, confidence and wisdom at this busy time, that we too may know his love in our lives afresh, and that our hearts will not be troubled in all we are asked to do, nor will we be afraid as we step out in the assurance that Jesus walks alongside us. So, enjoy, pause and reflect upon the road that is Lent and celebrate the joy of Easter possibly with a little bit of chocolate too.

God of the strong and weak walk alongside us, and grant us your perfect peace,
So that we can reflect ever more upon all your son Jesus Christ offered to us,
life eternal and Love everlasting,
Amen
