These ideas are designed to be intergenerational - maybe even to be shared with members of the family you can't see now except via the internet.

The resources are based on our non-uniformed children's groups, Friends on Faith Adventures and Pilots, but have been modified to make them suitable for all families at home.

These activities are planned to be used together as a family and under adult supervision. Please be aware of your family's ages and abilities as some activities may need more adult support than others. **Stay safe and have fun!**

Get to know your Bible

The Bible is like a library made up of 66 books written by many different people over many years.

The Old Testament books were written before Jesus was born. They are the holy stories he would have grown up hearing and reading. There are 39 of these.

The New Testament tells us the stories of Jesus and his followers. There are 27 books in the


New Testament.

Bible context - Matthew

Matthew was written around 60 AD by the disciple of the same name. Matthew was a tax collector before he decided to follow Jesus and he often writes for the Jews, showing how Old Testament prophesies are fulfilled in Jesus as the promised king. No surprise then, that he includes the story of the wise men, star gazers and astrologers who travelled from the East to visit the new born king. We can't be sure how many wise men came. But they brought with them three gifts. Jesus would have been a toddler by the time the wise men visited him.

The Story – Matthew 2: 1-12 (The International Children's Bible)

Jesus was born in the town of Bethlehem in Judea during the time when Herod was king. After Jesus was born, some wise men from the east came to Jerusalem. They asked, "Where is the baby who was born to be the king of the Jews? We saw his star in the east. We came to worship him."

When King Herod heard about this new king of the Jews, he was troubled. And all the people in Jerusalem were worried too. Herod called a meeting of all the leading priests and teachers of the law. He asked them where the Christ would be born. They answered, "In the town of Bethlehem in Judea. The prophet wrote about this in the Scriptures: 'But you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,

you are important among the rulers of Judah.

A ruler will come from you.

He will be like a shepherd for my people, the Israelites." Micah 5:2

Then Herod had a secret meeting with the wise men from the east. He learned from them the exact time they first saw the star. Then Herod sent the wise men to Bethlehem. He said to them, "Go and look carefully to find the child. When you find him, come tell me. Then I can go worship him too."

The wise men heard the king and then left. They saw the same star they had seen in the east. It went before them until it stopped above the place where the child was. When the wise men saw the star, they were filled with joy. They went to the house where the child was and saw him with his mother, Mary. They bowed down and worshiped the child. They opened the gifts they brought for him. They gave him treasures of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. But God warned the wise men in a dream not to go back to Herod. So they went home to their own country by a different way.

Ideas to Retell/Explore the Story

Giving Yourself a Gift for Next Christmas

As you take down and pack away all your Christmas decorations, take some time to write yourself a note and pack it away in the same box. Next Christmas when you come to unpack the decorations you will find the lovely surprise and you will encourage yourself. You could include a little gift with it to make you all smile.

Fun Pass the Present Game

Everyone chooses a present/item that they are willing to play the game with (there is a chance you won't finish the game with the gift you began with.)

Everyone takes it in turn to roll a dice and follow the instructions. The dice goes round the group three times then the game is over and you all keep the present you are holding.

Roll a One – Everyone passes their gift to the left one place

Roll a Two – Everyone passes their gift to the right one place

Roll a Three – You swap your present with anyone else

Roll a Four – The youngest in the room can swap with anyone ese

Roll a Five – the oldest in the room can swap with anyone else

Roll a Six – no present moves

Pray Together

Matchbox Prayer



Cut out the template and fold along all the dotted lines. Fold together to form a box and glue in the sides. Make the cover in the same way. You can decorate the box to make it more like a gift. Cut out a crown shape and the three gift shapes from card and colour them in. Place the gifts in the box.



Hold the matchbox and remember there have been many surprises in the Christmas story. The wise men followed a star that led them to find Jesus.

Open the matchbox and take out the crown. Remember that Jesus was born to be King, yet he did not look like a king lying in manger, born in a stable.

Dear Jesus *Pray together:*

> Help us to find you, Jesus our King,

everywhere we look. Amen

Hold up the gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Remember that these are the three special gifts that the wise men brought to Jesus. Think about what gift you would bring to Jesus.

Please be with us in all we do and say. In the sad times and the happy times, In the bad times and the good times,

We give you everything we do. **Amen**


🧏 Christmas Cards Prayers

TO DO TOGETHER...

🔰 A Star

Cut out the star template and fold along the dotted lines.

Fold the long lines upwards and short lines downwards. Once folded glue the tabs and stick to a backing paper. You could use Christmas paper for this, or make use of an old envelope. Find somewhere to hang your star.



Hobby Horse Camel

You will need: Cardboard tube

Kitchen roll tube Stiff cardboard

Ribbon

What you do:

Using the template cut out two camel heads.

Attach one head to the tube and then add the spacer tabs before joining the other head piece to the opposite side of the tube and spacers. Secure with tape to ensure the tube stays in place.

Draw on eyes nose and mouth, and then decorate with ribbons.

TO DO TOGETHER...

Crown Gift Box

You will need: Four pieces of A4 card

or a stiff gift bag

What you do:

Cut two templates out - one for the lid and one for the box.

For the main box, follow example one (this is not to size), the centre square will be the finished size of your box. Cut along the diagonal solid lines and fold along the dotted lines. (The wider the side panels, the deeper your box will be. Fold the sides up and glue or tape the tabs created to the sides to form your box.

For the lid, follow example two, (this is not to size) the centre square should measure 3mm larger than the main box. The side panels will be narrower cut along the solid lines and fold along the dotted lines. Glue the tabs formed to the sides, to create a box lid shape.















Decorate your box and lid to make a beautiful box to store your old cards and tags in.









TO DO TOGETHER...

Crown Cakes

You will need: For the Cake:

100 g (4 oz) softened butter 100 g (4 oz) caster sugar

Two large eggs

100 g (4 oz) self-raising flour 1 level tsp baking powder For the Icing:
White piping icing
Coloured fondant icing
Coloured writing icing







What you do:

Heat the oven to 200C fan, 180C fan, gas 6.

Place fairy cake cases into a 12-hole bun tin.





Measure all the ingredients into a large bowl and beat for 2-3 mins until the mixture is well blended and smooth. Fill each paper case with the mixture.



Bake in the preheated oven for 15-20 minutes until the cakes are well risen and golden brown. Lift the paper cases out of the bun tin and cool the cakes on a wire rack.

Create mini crowns by rolling a small ball of red or blue icing and flattening the bottom. You can cut a cross into the top.

Roll out a piece of yellow to form a rectangle and cut into strips about 0.5cm wide. Lay two strips over the ball and push them gently into the cross on the top (use a little water to help them stick). Trim the ends off. Place one strip around the base of the crown and trim to fit.

To add jewels, decorate using small dots of writing icing. Put to one side.

Once the cakes are cool, pipe a swirl of piping icing on the top. Place the crown on the top. Alternatively, you can cut off the top of your cake and shape it into a crown shape, then put a swirl of icing on your cake and rest the crown on the top.







TO DO TOGETHER...

Gifts of Hope and Joy

You will need: Some small boxes

Purple card or wrapping paper

Ribbon

What you do:

Punch a hole in the top of the small box and create a hanging loop using thread or ribbon.

Wrap the box in purple paper or wrapping paper and then decorate using some ribbon around it to create a gift.

If you don't have any small boxes, why not use a cube template and make a box out of cardboard? Remember to cut tabs to help you glue the box into shape.

You could use the gold pen to write the words HOPE and JOY on the sides of the box as a reminder that Christmas commemorates God's greatest gift to us. Another idea might be to write the words using glue and then sprinkle glitter on it. Now hide your decorations away ready to put on your tree for Christmas 2021.

Our Walking the Way Challenge this time is...

At Home:

Make some cardboard stars – you could even stick some tin foil on one side of them to make them shiny. On the back, write the words "A gift of Joy for 2021". Now hide them around the house in places where other members of the family might find them. As you hide them, ask God to be with the person who finds each one. As you find them, say a prayer of thanks for all the good gifts God has given you, including the gift of God's love. Then hide them again for someone else to find.

Outside:

It's another good time for star-gazing.
The wise ones followed a star which led
them to Jesus. Wrap up warm, go outside,
and see if you can spot the brightest star
in the sky. Look at the beauty of the
heavens and spend a bit of time asking
God to be present with you throughout
2021.

For Others:

You may have received some special presents this Christmas that need a bit of space to store them in, so this is the perfect opportunity to give a gift of joy to someone else. See if you can find some children's books you've outgrown which you could donate to a local doctor's surgery for their waiting room once the pandemic restrictions are over.


