Working from home for Rohingya refugees

Living through displacement is difficult enough but adding a global pandemic makes things even harder. In Cox's Bazar, Christian Aid partners have been preparing for Covid-19 in the refugee camps to support the Rohingya population through this difficult time. With such close living conditions hygiene is especially important.

Christian Aid partners have been strengthening the hygiene stations, adding more hand washing facilities, training people in how to protect themselves and training health workers and volunteers in the community.

One of the big concerns is an economic one. Social distancing measures have meant that many people have lost their income. Christian Aid partner DSK has been providing training to Rohingya women in handicraft work making cushion covers, home decorations and mosquito net covers.

Movement restrictions within the camps threatened to put a halt to the training as groups could no longer meet together. DSK have put measures in place to allow the training to continue.

There is now a rota which allows five women per day to attend the training centre while others work from home. The trainers have been provided with protective equipment to allow them to visit workers at home safely and bring materials and collect finished products.

The home-based trainees have appreciated the efforts from DSK to let them work from their homes and continue to earn their living and this has helped with the worry and uncertainty about income.
