

The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time *by Mark Haddon (???)*



The Hiding Place


by Corrie Ten Boom, with Elizabeth Sherill & John Sherrill (Hodder & Stoughton)


My Father Was a Hero by Cole Moreton (Viking)

Finding My Feet by Jason Robinson (Hodder)



Real Teens, Real Stories, Real Life




Fresh



Table Talk for Forces (<u>www.table-talk.org</u>)

Collection of leading questions to fire-up discussion. This particular pack relates to the Armed Forces, asking whether there is ever a right and a wrong side in conflict, whether there is a place for extremists in society, what it really means to be 'fit'...The list goes on!

Two great blog entries from Adriel Booker exploring some of the key concepts and characteristics we are given a great opportunity to encounter is our twenties. A young Christian woman seeking to make a difference in the world around her, Booker offers intriguing thoughts and advice useful to all.

Ignore the 'suitable for teens' label. This collection of 'discussion starters' will have young adults talking just as much! Sections include racism, pornography and suffering to just to name a few, linking crucial issues with bible passages to enhance conversations. No easy answers, of course, but, rather, much needed debate.

Sometimes, the best way to start a discussion is to listen to someone who has a bright idea. TED Talks are a great way to find such people, on video. This fantastic collection of talks on every subject one could possibly imagine is updated vey regularly. Videos tend to last 15-20 minutes, offering inspiring ideas, provocative thoughts, engaging strategies and intriguing questions.



Share The Meal (United Nations World Food Programme)

This innovative app introduces young adults to the responsibility of sacrifice in serving those less fortunate than themselves. It encourages users to donate a small amount, every time they eat a particular food or do a particular thing, to feed someone in poverty. Drowning in the Shallow *by Andy Flanagan* (<u>http://www.andyflan.com/</u>)






Student Linkup (<u>https://www.studentlinkup.org/</u>)


Prayerworks – the manual (24-7, *Oasis* and *Spring Harvest*)

An invaluable source of advice, ideas, resources and encouragement for setting up prayer spaces based around the Gospel command to 'love God and love your neighbour', a difficult demand, requiring our reflection, focus and action. Includes guidance on running a week of prayer.

This free e-book by Jo Swinney of Scripture Union contains studies accompanying 'The Bible mini-series'. It can be used individually but also works well for groups. Each study follows an episode and explores the story, characters and enables the group to grapple with some of the more puzzling and complex aspects of the story.



'The Manual' – Bible notes for men by Carl Beech and guest contributors (Crusade for World Revival)

This collection of (currently) six books contains 60 days of readings, notes and prayers per volume, aimed at aiding men to develop their faith in, and walk with, God. Recommended by youth workers for older young people journeying through college, university, work or whatever else life throws at them as they enter the 'big wide world'.

A fascinating, free collection of Bible studies to accompany films. Offered by the Bible Society, these materials allow viewers to take one or two scenes and use them as discussion starters, or to explore a whole film of their choice in a much deeper way than they might otherwise in relation to Scripture. Suitable for a range of situations and contexts.



Radicalising Bible Studies: An Introduction (Council for World Mission)

The Bible is not simply a collection of quaint tales. It's a library of controversial, radical books which call us into action as we seek to build a better world. This collection of Bible Studies, with contributions from around the globe, seeks to open up the extraordinary ways in which scripture has, is and can influence in making this a fairer, more just world to live in.




Palindrome Poetry (<u>https://youtu.be/gjWSVrMUejo</u>)


The Story of God's Love for You by Sally Lloyd-Jones and Jago (Zondervan)

Looks at personal worship, fellowship, discipleship, ministry and evangelism in exploring God's unique purpose for each of our lives.



Banned Questions about the Bible by Christian Piatt (Chalice Press)



Sport




Christians In Sport (<u>www.christiansinsport.org.uk</u>)




Love Life Live Lent






CAFOD Advent



by Chap Clark and Kara E. Powell (Zondervan)


