# **Ascension and Pentecost**



### understanding our Father

#### **AIMS**

To help us understand better that the One we are praying to is a loving Father who delights in us and wants the very best for us. You can use this with a group or individually.

#### INTRODUCTION

We are so used to addressing God as "Our Father" that we probably don't realise how profoundly shocking this concept was to Jesus' original hearers.

In the Old Testament, God was sometimes referred to as the Father of the nation of Israel but there was no concept of an individual having a father-child relationship with Him. Then Jesus comes along and refers to God as "Abba", the expression a child would use. It's probably better translated "Daddy" and implies a close, intimate relationship between God and His children.

Yet for some of us the concept of "father" is a difficult one. We may never have known our earthly father or may have had bad experiences of our fathers. None of us had perfect fathers. The result is that we find it difficult to know what God is really like as our 'Heavenly Daddy'. We so easily assume He must be like our earthly fathers were. But He isn't.

Many have found the following declaration really helpful. Read it out together.

loving and gentle and protective (see Jeremiah 31:3; Isaiah 42:3; Psalm 18:2).

trying to take all the fun out of life.

trustworthy and wants to give me a full life; His will is good, perfect and

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acceptable for me (see Lamentations 3:22, 23; John 10:10; Romans 12:1-2).

controlling or manipulative. full of grace and mercy, and gives me

freedom to fail (see Hebrews 4:15, 16;

condemning or unforgiving. tender-hearted and forgiving; His heart

and arms are always open to me (see

Psalm 130:1-4; Luke 15:17-24).

nit-picking or a demanding perfectionist.
